# Learn about Ice Racing

The meeting introduced ice racing, highlighting its competitive yet clean nature. Ice racing takes place at the Minden fairgrounds from mid-January to March, with events organized by Ontario car clubs and sanctioned by the Canadian Automobile Sports Club. Participants need a car club membership (\$30-\$50) and a CAC license (\$50 plus HST). Entry fees are \$125 for Saturday and \$85 for Sunday, with additional costs for tires, travel, and housing. The session covered car preparation, including tire choices (street studs or tractionized rubber), safety modifications, and the importance of lightweight vehicles. Volunteers are crucial for event organization, with 22-25 needed per weekend.

## **Action Items**

- [] Get a car club membership and CAC license.
- [] Choose a car and prepare it for ice racing, including removing lights, adding a number sign, and making other required modifications.
- [] Email the ice race director to get a car number assigned.
- [] If bringing a child passenger aged 9-13, ensure they have a 4-point harness.
- [] Disable the car if leaving it at the track between race weekends (e.g. remove battery, wheel, etc.).
